There are many retired members who dedicated a life's work to developing TAA and continued to support the TAA 25 Year Club even when retired.

The Committee recently agreed to establish a special award recognising the achievements of individuals and their service to both the airline and the 25 Year Club and based upon these criteria, the award grants Life Membership to the 25 Year Club.

The committee has reviewed the qualifying members and decided that the nomination for the first award should be to a foundation member and it is with pleasure that we announce our last General manager, Frank Ball, foundation member, foundation pilot, Manager Flying Operations and a member who had risen from the ranks to become General Manager by the time he retired in 1985, as the first recipient.

During this time Frank also held the position of President of the TAA 25 Year club from 1981 until retirement, and attended numerous functions with Rae, his wife, in retirement.

Frank's career was indeed a colourful and varied one influencing the future of the airline and the many people with whom he came in contact, not only pilots.

<u>Memorabilia</u> — Our collection continues to grow with many donations now being received from visitors who continue to be amazed by the size and display methods in your museum. Many visitors are members of Probus Groups who arrive by bus and Moonee Valley Council have agreed to relocate a bus stop outside the front door of the museum and Tim Acton is vigorously recruiting visitors with his many talks. We are eternally grateful for all donations as it ensures that our history continues to exist and the collection continues to grow.

Theatrette and Film Conversion-

The relocation of the theatrette to the body of the museum has allowed us to recreate the seating that was applicable to the configuration of our first flight DC3 back in 1946 i.e. 21 seats and in an area similar in size to the cabin of that aircraft. This is a real bonus as it allows us to split group visitors and conduct a tour for part of the group whilst the other part views some of the recovered 16mm film which is now on DVD. And speaking of film conversion since Ray Splatt (Ex TAA Engineer) joined our volunteer group;

Ray has managed to convert over 50 films to DVD as he has a lot of experience since he commenced to convert his home movies, a talent now being applied to our aging 16mm film stocks. Thanks Ray.
